In the event of this proposal being approved, the likely wording of the rules will be :

7. THE COMMITTEE OF THE CLUB

- (a) The Committee shall consist of the Commodore, Vice-Commodore, The Rear-Commodore, the Honorary Secretary, the Hon. Sailing-Secretary, the Hon. Treasurer, the Hon. Social Secretary, the Club Bosun, the Class Captains, one Cadet Member and four other members of the Club, and at any meeting of the Committee, five shall be a quorum.=
- (b) The Commodore, Hon. Secretary, Hon. Sailing Secretary, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Social Secretary, Club Bosun, Class Captains and Cadet Member, shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting. A member so appointed shall retire at the next annual general meeting but shall be eligible for re-election.
- (c) As 7(c) now.
- (d) The remaining four members of the Committee shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, and of these four, two members shall retire annually by rota, and shall be eligible for re-election, for the ensuing year.
- (e) As 7(e) now.
- (f) As 7(f) now.

3. To consider the following proposal made by J. A. Samuel and supported by the Committee:

"That Rule 24 be amended to allow Sub-Committees to be set up with a minimum of two members of the Committee on them, instead of four as at present:

In the event of this proposal being approved, the likely wording of the Rule will be:

24. The Committee shall have power to appoint from time to time sub sub-committees as they think fit, provided that not less than two members of any sub-committee shall be members of the Committee, and one of these such members shall be the chairman of the sub-committee, and that vacation of office from the general committee shall also involve vacation of office on any sub-committee. No such sub-committee shall be appointed to be concerned with the purchase for the Club or with the supply by the Club of intoxicating liquor, unless all the members of such sub-committee are members of the main committee, who go out of office on the sub committee on ceasing to be members of the main committee.

Dear Members,

At the end of another season, this time it really is a pleasure to look back at the past year, and I have no qualms about putting my summary of the year's activities in print. Principally this has been the year of the National Scorpion Championships and there can be few of us who will forget it. But it has also been a year in which the petty problems of last year have been forgotten and the improved atmosphere of friendliness in the Club has been most noticeable.

That such a turn in the fortunes of the Club should occur in so short a time cannot be put down to the influence of any one person. Indeed, it has been the increase in numbers of people who have been prepared to put themselves out that has made all the difference. And the Nationals have been instrumental in bringing everyone together to achieve an outcome which was so successful that it surpassed my wildest dreams, let alone my fears.

In thanking everyone for their contribution, I feel I must mention names, even at the expense of missing out many who may also deserve a mention. But the list is a very long one, and could be extended to almost everybody in the Club, I'm pleased to be able to say. At the head of the list I would like to place Tony Samuel. Tony has been a tower of strength, not only for his organisation of the many things which fall to a Sailing Secretary's lot, but also for his many contacts, his experience, his quiet competence and his willing provision of the dory. Sue Samuel has played a prominent part with Pam Jenkins, Jane Phyll and Norma Vigus in the "Ladies Committee who have organised the galley so effectively. Did you realise that we haven't had a Social Secretary this year?

Chris Millard has been another key person. This year we have depended on Chris not only for the stocking and organisation of the bar, but also for the immense responsibility of the catering at the Nationals. He it was who took this entirely off the shoulders of the rest of us, and with the co-operation of Diann Berry who returned from Chichester to run the catering on a day-to-day basis and with others, especially Jim Nicklen on the bar and Peter and Jenny Pope, you can see the result of their efforts in the financial statements.

Of course, the Nationals put a very heavy responsibility on the Principal Race Officer. That we had no protests against the Race Committee and no problems even when gales were forecast is a clear indication of the effective way in which Peter Milln controlled the racing. And without the generosity in the giving of their time and their respective boats of Maurice Millard, John Matthews and Robin Hadlow, we should not have been able to undertake the Nationals at all. Indeed it is these people who undertook at an early stage to carry out certain tasks, many unselfishly taking a weeks holiday to do so; these are the people to whom thanks are most due. Barry Vigus and Andy Nancarrow were prime movers in the whole thing, and worked prodigiously to organise many aspects; Paul Jenkin who oversaw most of the social sub-committee's work as well as building gates and so on; Ted Tucker who in spite of a tremendous work load associated with his swimming Area Chairman's position still managed to find time to be Beachmaster and help during the preceding week; Les and Ruby Wightman who are always helping at some job or other, if not several at once, Stuart Barker who compiled the Sailing Instructions and got nothing wrong as far as I can tell and who also supported Tony throughout the year; Jureck Douglas; Dennis Mitchell, Max Evans and Les again and others on rescue boats. The Batemans on the tallies; Arthur Whittamore on the Committee Boat and with his carpentry.

COMMODORE'S REPORT Continued

As I write, so I can think of many others who did their bit. I must not forget to mention Col. Petherick and his brother, who put on a Garden Party for us - I still worry about whether they knew what they were letting themselves in for, but it worked perfectly, even the weather providing a few minutes of rain at 7.30 precisely, which got everyone to start moving at the end. And David Phyll who must have performed some miracles of financial wizardry to keep us all on the rails, not only over the Nationals but all the year - certainly the budgets prepared last year were vital. Peter Waters who printed the programme for us; the advertisers who succumbed to various arm twisters; including David, Vosper Marine who lent the inflatable rescue boat; Reg Marsh who helped us with engine repairs that could easily have left us without enough cover, the Morgans who nearly roasted themselves in the barbeque! Also those of Restormel Borough Council who helped - the Mayor and Deputy Mayor and the publicity people, Mr. Arthur and Mr. Brown of the Leisure Services. Mr. Kielbart who helped us greatly with his arrangements in the car park.

But we should beware of thinking that it was easy - we so nearly had chaos several times but had just enough good luck and good friends to get through - the organisation on the water was stretched several times and we nearly had a disaster with engine breakdowns; the rescue boats were not all as effective in rough water as they needed to be; the space for boat parking was only just sufficient; the car park only overflowed once but the weather was bad enough to keep people off the beach; protests could have caused more problems than they did, we might have had a succession of Easterlies, or no wind at all or Fastnet gales! But the abiding memory is of a contented entry, satisfied with good well laid courses and good sailing and very complimentary. I have received several letters of congratulations and not only from those who won! And while it would seem to me that the Scorpions would love to return - indeed many said as much - we would be well advised not to repeat the effort too soon.

But one week has not made up the season. The other weeks have gone well too. There has been a marvellous regeneration of interest in Mirrors with a keenness which has even been in need of restraint at times. But it is splendid to see, and promises well for the Club. The Lasers have not had quite so active a year but have kept a good fleet. The Enterprises have been very steady as ever, and there are promises of more for next year. And the Scorpions of course while not being rejuvenated at a stroke show signs of increased interest with new helms looking and buying and some old ones showing renewed interest.

My thanks to all those who have kept the Club running throughout the year - Di Nicklen our Hon. Secretary who is retiring this year and all the other members of the Committee.

Altogether, 1979 seems to have been one of the yest years that the Club has had for a long time. I hope you will give the next Commodore the same support that you have given me.

In giving my report, I have reverted to the format adopted in 1977 by the then Sailing Secretary. On the back of this report is a statistical analysis of turnouts amongst the various classes for the season, with last year's figures in brackets. You should also receive a complete list of results, although these do not form part of this report.

The season started on 31st March with a fresh north westerly which was the same for the next few races. The first two weekends were well supported with eleven boats in each race and a promise for better things later in the season. We then had the best supported Easter Cup series for many years with fifteen boats competing in three classes. Sadly the Scorpions were not represented at all. At the beginning of May, we began some open evenings on Wednesdays with the object of introducing anyone who wanted to sailing. Several of these people continued when Wednesday evening racing began later that month. The next event was the Spring Bank Holiday Weekend Series and all the classes were well supported with 19 boats on the water on the Sunday. On the 10th. June we set sail for Polkerris in a force 4 Easterly which meant a hard beat all the way. Lunch was taken at the pub (with champagne) and the 26 boats then planed back to Porthpean in about 30 minutes, whilst the rescue boat (with the clock) was delayed rescuing a couple of Lasers.

At the end of June, we held the Mirror Western Area Championships with 45 entries which included boats as far away as Oxford and London. It was good practice for the Scorpion Nationals a month later which must rank as the most ambitious event to be held at the club since its formation. The 132 entries (130 starters) meant that this was the fourth largest championship fleet of the year. A great success for the club but very hard work for those tireless workers who helped run the Championships. The Scorpion helms then helped to run the Regatta (72 entries) which proved another success in spite of the lack of wind on Sunday afternoon.


This year the Lasers shared their open meeting with the Enterprises early in September. Although the Lasers had good support with 28 boats, the Enterprises only had 11 entries (5 from Porthpean). More must really be done to encourage other Enterprises to come to the Porthpean Open Meeting, otherwise it will not be worth holding this event. The last few weeks were plagued with rough South-Easterly winds producing surfing conditions on the beach, but the last race was held in a force 2 South-Westerly with a good turnout of 22 boats promising a firm base from which to build next year.

The rescue boat engine has again given trouble with the control box and drive being continually faulty. Consideration must be given to replacing this engine with a simpler one with easier controls, and also the Dory which is beginning to get heavier as leaks appear in the hull. As a separate matter I have proposed changes in the composition of the comittee, one of which is the appointment of a Club Bosun to look after all club equipment.

Overall the Scorpions have been a big disappointment in attendance and the Lasers have declined, whereas the Enterprises remain static and the Mirrors have increased dramatically. Will we have different classes next year? Something for the new Sailing Sub-Committee to consider.

In general the weather (especially wind) has been good this year and the best week was reserved for the Scorpion Nationals. The spirit within the club and the co-operation between the classes has been good and the working of the O.O.D. and Rescue Boat rotas has been successful helped by the early notification of duties and reminders by post.

Finally I hope you will accept this report and will give my successor plenty of support in this very demanding office of the club.
